## Mike Henry Smith, Member At Large, with wife, Lynn Deidrie (Crandall) Smith



Mike was born in Fremont, Michigan, on October 23, 1946, to Henry Herr and Helena Mae (Vining) Smith, the first of 5 children (2 brothers and 2 sisters). Mike's siblings are Mark Murray, born in 1949, Cheryl Kay, born in 1959, Paul Lynn, born in 1956, and Deborah Jeanne, born in 1957. Paul passed in 1980 and Deborah passed in 2020. Helena's parents were Simeon Frank and Maggie Lena (Farrow) Vining of Flint, Michigan. Henry's parents were Carl Anderson and Susan (Axtell) Smith of Portland, Michigan.

Lynn was born in Windsor, Ontario, Canada, on July 27, 1947, to William Henry and Hazel Theresa (Rocheleau) Crapper of Windsor, Ontario, Canada. She was the first of 3 children (1 brother and 1 sister). Lynn's siblings are Randolph Cameron, born in 1949, and Susan Joy, born in 1951. Hazel's parents were Noe and Marie Rose (Pare) Rocheleau, also of Windsor. William's parents were William Henry, Sr., and Annie (Dewar) Crapper, again of Windsor.

Mike grew up and went to high school in Gaylord, Michigan, where his father was the school principal and his mother was a teacher; he graduated in 1964. Lynn's parents emigrated to the US in 1952 and settled in Dearborn, Michigan. They were naturalized as American citizens and changed the family name to Crandall. Her father, Bill, was first a tool and diemaker for Chrysler and later a salesman for the Amplex Division. Hazel, or Terry as she wanted to be known, was a full charge accountant for a charity. Lynn graduated from Edsel Ford High School in 1965.

Mike and Lynn both went to the University of Michigan, where Mike earned a Bachelor's Degree in Aerospace Engineering and Lynn earned a Bachelor's Degree in Business. They were married on August 10, 1968, in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. After graduation in 1969, they moved to Wichita, Kansas. Mike worked for Cessna Aircraft Company and Lynn earned her Certified Public Accountant's certificate. In 1985, Mike next took a job with Northrop Grumman Corporation and they moved to Camarillo, California. Northrop posted Mike to a position in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1995 where they lived until returning to Lakewood, Illinois in 2000. Mike retired and returned to Michigan in 2005, building a lakeside house in the Huron National Forest near Tawas, Michigan. In 2017, they added a winter home in Nokomis, FL, and in 2019 they moved the Michigan home to Hamburg Township near Brighton.

Mike's maternal grandfather, Simeon Frank Vining was born in Elmer, Michigan, in 1893 to Murray and Lily (De Lille) Vining. Mike's maternal grandmother, Maggie Lena Farrow, was born in Brant, Ontario, Canada, in 1884 to George Henry and Sarah Agnes (Baker) Farrow and emigrated to the Flint, Michigan, area with her parents in 1896. Simeon and Lena, as she preferred to be known, were married in Flint in 1914. They had 3 daughters: Agnes in 1916, Joyce in 1918, and Helena (Mike's mother) in 1922. Simeon's family were farmers in Sanilac County, Michigan, but Simeon became a machinist and tool and diemaker working for Marvel Carburetors in Flint. Simeon had 1 older sister, Edna, 4 younger sisters: Sarah, Maude, Bernice and Lyllian- and 2 younger brothers, Glidden and Roy. Lena was a homemaker. She had 1 older brother: Asa, 2 younger sisters – Mary and Dorothy - and 1 younger brother, Curtis.

From here we will concentrate, for obvious reasons, on the Vining line.

Thanks to Dorothy Vining Barnes' fine book, we have the entire Vining branch of my family tree laid out from Robert and Mary of Wincanton through John all the way to yours truly. To save you the trouble of looking that up, I will reproduce just the direct line here:

Simeon Vining, who married Lena Farrow, parents of my mother, Helena Vining, and so on.

This branch of the Vining tree ends with Simeon, as he had only daughters.

That's my story!

#### Some anecdotes:

Ebeneezer (1754-1843) fought on the rebel side in the American War for independence. After the war, he became a Baptist minister, the only occupation open to him other than farming at the time. His son, Salmon, my 3<sup>rd</sup> great grandfather, stayed in the family business and emigrated to Nissouri Twp. (near London), Ontario, Canada where he established a church. There is still standing a Vining Cemetery near the reputed location of that church that contains several (51?) Vining family members.

In researching my wife's family line, I learned that her 3<sup>rd</sup> great grandfather was a lay minister in the Catholic Church in – Nissouri Twp., Ontario. I doubt they were fast friends but considering that Nissouri Twp. was a small farming community, then it's very likely that they knew each other.

Salmon eventually emigrated to a farm in the tiny community of Snover, Michigan, where my great grandfather Murray and grandfather Simeon were born. We have uncovered no family history of their experiences in the 1881 Thumb Fire on September 5 of that year. Salmon had passed by then but Murray would have been living on the farm near Snover at the age of 13. The fire was a major conflagration that burned over a million acres and killed 282 people in 4 counties in less than a day. We don't know how my great grandfather survived, but there are eyewitness reports of families, surviving by climbing down into their water wells. Entire families and all their possessions, including buildings and livestock were wiped out. There's no record of anyone in Murray's family being killed, and my grandfather never mentioned the event as a part of the family history. I suspect his father never brought it up, although he must have been through it. The culprit: Spanish influenza. On October 4th his wife Lily had a child hat was either stillborn or lived only a few minutes – the family named him Roy, but the cemetery where he's buried shows the name John, and the death certificate has no given name, simply using "infant." She was treated by a doctor that has been heavily involved in treating Spanish influenza throughout the area, and she died of the flu, on October 22. Their eldest daughter, Edna, died two days later, their son Edward died on the 25<sup>th</sup> and their youngest son Glidden Bodwell died on the 26<sup>th</sup>. Simeon had moved to Flint and married 4 years earlier and thus missed being infected. Murray left the farm and lived in the Upper Peninsula with a brother's family for several years, finally returning to Flint in the later years.
